The Duke Autism Volunteer Research Registry is the main way that the Duke Center for Autism and Brain Development stays connected with the community. People of **all ages** and **abilities**, **with or without a diagnosis of autism are invited to join the registry.**

PARTICIPATION IS VOLUNTARY

Being in the Registry is always completely voluntary. You are free to withdraw at any time and your decision about participating will not affect your access to clinical care.

ENROLL ONLINE

Enrolling in the Autism Research Registry is easy! By going to the link below, you can read the consent form and if you agree to participate, you will be asked to enter some information about you (or your child) into our secure database, such as demographic and contact information. We also ask about any diagnoses you or your child have received.
